

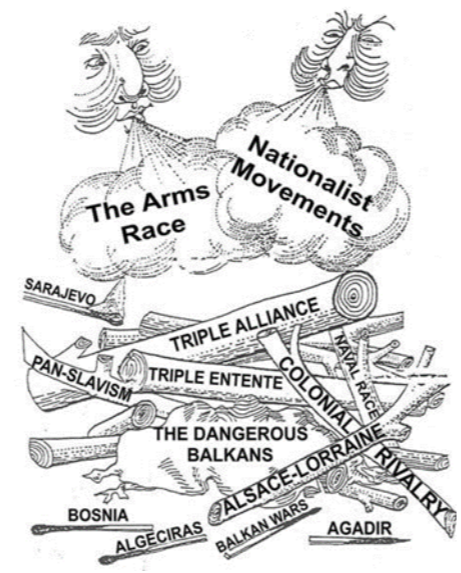
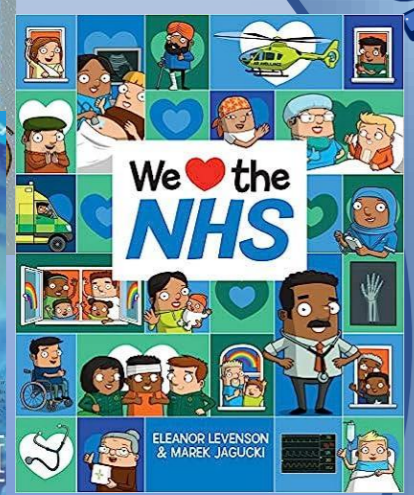
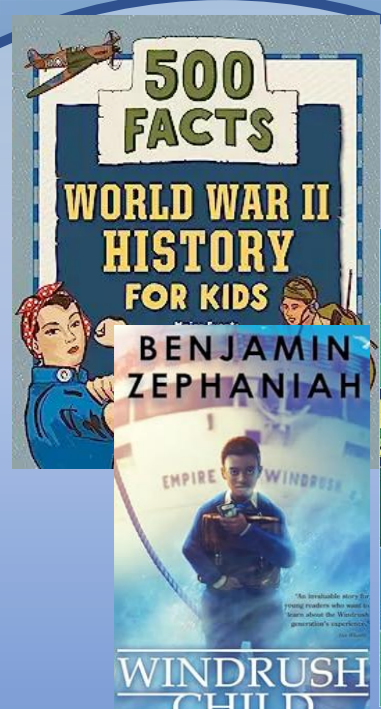

- ★ The Triple Alliance was a secret agreement between Germany, Austria-Hungary and Italy.
- ★ The assassination of Archduke Franz Ferdinand (the heir to the throne of Austria - Hungary) was one of the reasons that the First World War began.
- ★ The Black Hand was a secret society of Serbs dedicated to unite all Serbs in the Balkans
- ★ The First World War began in 1914 and ended in 1918

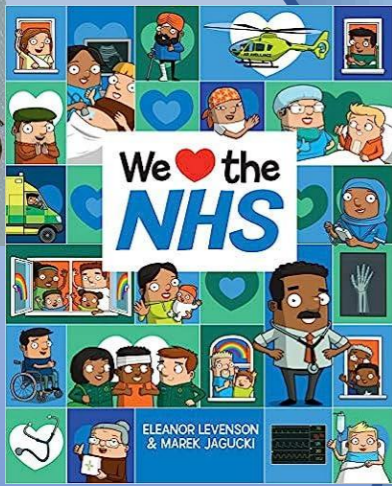
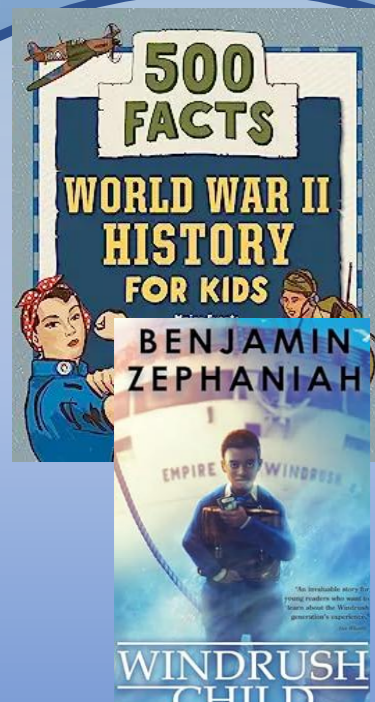

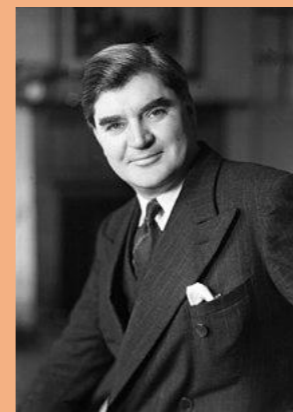

Aneurin "Nye" Bevan PC was a Welsh Labour Party politician, noted for tenure as Minister of Health in Clement Attlee's government in which he spearheaded the creation of the British National Health Service. He is also known for his wider contribution to the founding of the British welfare state. Bevan is widely regarded as one of the most influential left-wing politicians in British history.

Appeasement

Letting someone have their way for a good cause

Conscription

The orderly selection of people (usually men) for required military service.

Rationing

Rationing was the system of limiting people's access to food, clothes, and fuel. This was put in place because of shortages.

Industry

A group of businesses that make or sell similar products or perform similar services.

Welfare State

A state that is committed to providing basic economic security for its citizens

British Empire

A term used to describe all the places around the world that were once ruled by Britain.

Civilians

People not in the armed services or police force.

- ✦ Neville Chamberlain tried to respond to Hitler and to explore the arguments for and against appeasement.
- ✦ The Blitz was the name given to the bombing raids that Germany launched against Britain in 1940, during World War II.
- ✦ Conscription began on the day war was declared. Any man aged 18-41 could be called upon to fight in the war.
- ✦ Government Spending, Britain's workforce, homes and families, industries and businesses, travel and transport and health were some of the things affected by the war.
- ✦ The National Health Service was created in 1948.

The Vale of York Viking Hoard is one of the most important Viking discoveries ever made in Britain. This spotlight display showed the fantastic objects within the Capital of the North exhibition, telling fascinating stories about life across the Viking world.

The Vale of York Hoard was discovered in North Yorkshire in January 2007 by two metal-detectorists, David and Andrew Whelan, who kept the find intact and promptly reported it to their local Finds Liaison Officer. It was declared Treasure in 2009 and was valued at £1,082,000 by the independent Treasure Valuation Committee. The size and quality of the material in the hoard is remarkable, making it the most important find of its type in Britain for over 150 years.

- The Anglo Saxons, Vikings and other ancient civilisations were involved in different power struggles which resulted in wars, battles and constant fighting.
- The attack on Lindisfarne (an Island on the north-east of England) happened in 793.
- It is important to consider history from a range of sources to avoid a biased viewpoint.
- The Vikings were skilled crafters, explorers, navigators, traders and linguists.
- Vikings organised their society in a way which was collaborative and fair.
- The Danelaw was the part of England in which the laws of the Danes held sway and dominated the Anglo-Saxons.
- During this time the country began to be better run because more people could read and write, they kept better records, including laws.
