The four steps of reconciliation are contrition, confession, satisfaction and absolution.

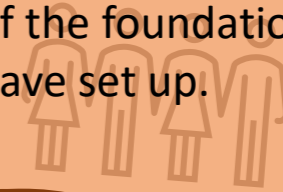
Christians forgive even the most terrible sins because there is no sin that God cannot forgive.

**Atonement** – to make amends for our sins.

**Resurrection** - the act or fact of bringing someone back to life, or bringing something back into use or existence

**Reconciliation** – To bring back together, or to restore.

**Repentance** – the act of feeling sorry for something you've done.

**Salvation** - the act of keeping away from evil or saving from sin

**Absolution** – the act of being freed from your guilt or sin.

**Contrition** – the feeling of feeling sorry for sins.

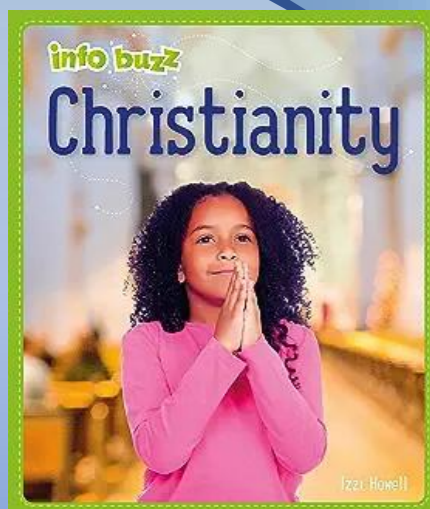

- Jesus is an incarnate of God.
- Christians believe there is one God who is the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. Christians call this the Holy Trinity.
- A baptism is a ceremony that symbolises a commitment to living life as a Christian.
- In an infant baptism, the parents make the choice for the baby to be baptised and the parents and godparents make the promises.
- In a believer's baptism, the person being baptised is older, makes their own choice to be baptised and makes their own promises.
- Confirmation means togetherness and confirmation is a ritual to show the togetherness of Christians and God.
- The Last Supper was Jesus' last meal before he died and he shared two signs with his followers: bread as a symbol for his body being broken, and wine as a symbol for his blood being spilled when he was crucified. This is used in Holy Communion

**Mother Theresa**  
Born in Skopje, then part of the Ottoman Empire, at the age of 18 she moved to Ireland and later to India, where she lived most of her life

**Milestone/ rite of passage** - a significant event in your life.

**Incarnate** - God in the flesh.

**Symbolism** - The use of symbols to represent a deeper meaning of things.

**Holy Communion** - a re-enactment of the last supper  
**Confirmation** - a rite in which a person is awarded full acceptance into Christianity.

**Commitment** - Doing what needs to be done regardless of your talents or needs.

**Sacrifice** - Something you give up for the sake of a better cause.
