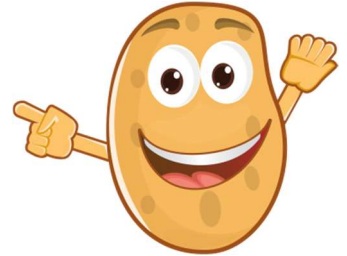


## I can use fronted adverbials
