3. Make your own quiz using PowerPoint about your favourite book that you can share during teams meetings.

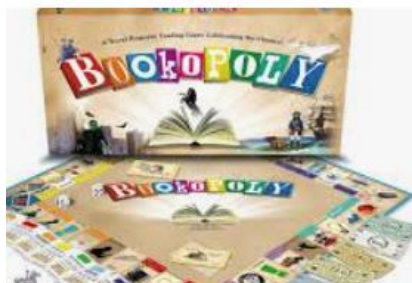


4. Create a word search or crossword about your favourite book. Maybe you could use the characters names and different vocabulary from the text.
