


Outcomes of Parental Voice Survey July 2023


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Q1 My child /ren is / are in Year: Multiple Choice

90 parents / carers took part in our survey representing 90 of our children (approximatey 20% of our total number of children on roll).




100% of parents / carers felt that their child is happy at Allanson Street which is fabulous to hear.



97.8% of parents / carers expressed that their child/ren feel safe in school whilst 2.2% were unsure. I would urge those parents / carers who are unsure to speak to their child about this so that we can work together if there is anything that is making them feel unsafe.

If any parent is concerned with the safety of their child or doesn't know what we do to keep our children safe, please come and speak to us. We have a robust culture of safeguarding. We ensure all checks are completed on any visitors that come into school. Our grounds are secure and checked daily by our staff. We have regular fire and lockdown drills to ensure everyone in our building is aware of what is expected. We would encourage any parent that doesn't feel that their child is happy to please speak to their child's class teacher. We strive to ensure that school is a happy place and that learning is as engaging as possible. For those children who may be struggling with their mental health, we are very fortunate to have the support of a 4 strong pastoral team. We also have a mental health support worker who works in school for 1 day each week to support our children. It is of the utmost importance to us that our children feel safe both in school and at home so will always do everything we can to ensure this.



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91.1% of parents / carers feel that school does all it can to make sure the children are well behaved in school.

We have a clear and consistent behaviour and relationships policy. A copy of this can be found on our school website and a summary document is provided for parents / carers at the meet the teacher meetings in September.


In this policy, it explains that good behaviour must be learned. Some children will always be further along their behaviour learning journey than others just as some children find English / maths easier or more difficult than other children. However, with high quality teaching and the partnerships we foster with our children and their families, all children are able to make progress with their behaviour. Please rest assured that all staff in school take the behaviour of our children very seriously and do all they can to teach the children how to become the best versions of themselves.

If any parents / carers have any specific concerns around behaviour, I would urge them to speak to their child's class teacher.

My child has been bullied and the school dealt with the bullying quickly and effectively. Bullying is defined as 'repeated, negative behaviour from one child or group of children working together over...

From this survey, it would appear that 34.5% of parents / carers feel that their child has been bullied during their time at Allanson Street. Of this 34.5%, 27.8% feel that the behaviour was dealt with effectively and the issue resolved.

Any Head teacher who says that bullying does not happen in their school is, quite simply, either ill-informed or not being truthful. All schools experience bullying. What matters is that this behaviour is identified and resolved quickly with staff then undertaking regular check-ins to make sure that there is not a reoccurrence of the behaviour and, at Allanson Street, this is what we strive to do every single time.

This year, anti-bullying has been a huge focus for us. We now have anti-bullying ambassadors in each KS2 class who have undertaken lots of training to fulfil their roles. We also have anti-bullying buddies in our Key Stage 1 classes who have worked with the ambassadors so that they too can help to promote anti-bullying. Diversity, always with a focus on celebrating difference, has been a continuous theme in almost every assembly and similar themes are constantly revisited through the children's PSHE lessons.

We now have both an anti-bullying policy which can be found on our school website and a child's version of the policy which is displayed around school. Both of these policies are followed consistently in school.


As well as talking openly and honestly with our children about bullying both in PSHE sessions and in assemblies, the children have also watched an Anti-Bullying performance performed by visiting drama company, Altru Drama and we have worked with the charity, Diversity Counts to undertake training for all staff and workshops for all children in Years 4 – 6 focusing on inclusion.

Sometimes children falling out or a one-off moment of unkindness can be confused with bullying and, as such, we continue to teach the children what bullying actually is: 'repeated, negative behaviour from one child or group of children working together over a period of time that deliberately intends to make others feel upset, uncomfortable or unsafe'. This helps us to make sure that children know when and how to ask for help if they are feeling that they are being bullied.

When an allegation of bullying is made, staff working with the child collect as much information from the children and parents / carers as possible, will speak to the children and will monitor the behaviours for a short

period. Where it is felt that the behaviours could actually be a case of bullying, this is referred to either myself or Mrs Glynn (deputy headteacher) whereupon we carry out a full investigation. Every step is then taken to gather the full facts and action taken to ensure that the bullying is ceased immediately and does not reoccur. Parents / carers are kept informed and are encouraged to speak to their children regularly about the issue so that we can be alerted if the issue does reoccur, and relevant action taken.

If any parent / carer feels that incidents of bullying have not been effectively resolved after speaking to their child's class teacher, please always make an appointment to meet with me.




94.5% of parents / carers feel well informed about what their child will learn during the year.

We share information about what the children learn on our school website. However, we also share our curriculum with parents and carers through transition booklets and meet the teacher meetings at the beginning of the year.

We continue to use Class Dojo to share important news and some of this will relate to our curriculum including the extra-curricular opportunities and trips that we plan both of which are part of our wider curriculum. We now use Twitter /X to celebrate the children's learning so, if you connect to your child's class page and our school page, you will be kept well informed of the learning your child is undertaking.

Homework and home learning activities are always linked to what the children have been learning in class. As such, this is another way that parents / carers are kept informed.


Finally, we aim to deliver a curriculum which is engaging and which the children find interesting and enjoy. As such, we really hope they will come home and tell you all about it.




Of the 90 parents who completed the survey, 18.9% told us that they had not raised any concerns. Of the 81.2% that had, 74.5% felt that their concerns had been dealt with properly.

All issues reported to staff and the accompanying actions are logged on a recording system called CPOMs. This information is shared with all appropriate staff.

Going forward, staff will ensure that the actions taken to resolve a concern lodged by parents / carers are always fed back to the relevant parents / carers.






24.5% of the 90 participants of the survey felt that their child has Special Education Needs or a Disability. Question 9 was around whether the school provides our children with SEND with the support they need to succeed. Unfortunately, due to an issue with Survey Planet this question had to be answered by everyone rather than just those parents whose children had SEND. Therefore, we can assume that the 71.1% of parents / carers answering 'Don't know' do not have children with SEND. This means that of the 26 parents whose children have SEND, 85% feel that we provide their children with the support they need to succeed. I would strongly encourage the 15% of parents for whom this wasn't the case, to please get in touch with me or our SENDCo, Mrs Range, so that we can discuss this with you and explore further avenues of support.


As a school, we have a very good reputation for our SEND provision and this is often commented upon by our parents / carers, within the Local Authority and even on social media sites. In order to best support our SEND children, we have a non-teaching Special Needs and Disability Co-ordinator (SENDCo), Mrs Range, who is a member of our Senior Leadership Team. High priority is given to ensuring that the needs of all children are met through the highest quality teaching. We use a large proportion of our budget to ensure an above average ratio of staff to children. Assessment outcomes are used to track progress and highlight those children who require further intervention and support. Where we feel that a child would benefit from support from external agencies, teaching staff and Mrs Range work closely together to facilitate this. Where parents / carers have a concern about their child, we encourage them to speak to their child's class teacher in the first instance. If further support is required, Mrs Range will then meet with parents / carers to offer advice and plan next steps where appropriate.

Despite being proud of our SEND provision, we are always exploring ways to further improve the life chances of all of our children which includes ensuring the highest quality teaching, quality interventions and work on diversity and inclusion. This year, the development of our SEND provision will be a key priority for us so please keep an eye on Dojo for further updates.




93.3% of parents / carers agreed that school has high expectations for their child. 5.6% were unsure about this statement and 1.1% of parents /carers disagreed with this statement. Our school mottos is 'We are the best we can be' and we expect every child and adult to love up to this. If you have concerns about the expectations held for your child, please do speak to their class teacher. As mentioned, we invest a great deal of time, money and energy to ensure that the learning opportunities on offer give children every chance to achieve their very best academically. Our school values are promoted and used consistently across school to ensure children are aware of the expectations we have of them to behave appropriately and to employ a positive mindset to their

learning. The use of rewards and sanctions, assemblies and celebration events are used effectively to ensure our high expectations of the children remain high profile.




100% of the parents who took part in the survey felt that their child 'does well' at Allanson Street Primary School. We're very happy to say that we agree with this statement.



92.2% of parents / carers feel that school lets them know how their child is doing. 2.2 % are not sure about this statement and 5.6% disagree with this statement.


We are very proud of, and grateful for, the effective, positive relationships we have with our families and we know that an essential part of building these relationships is through good communication, particularly when it comes to discussing your child's progress. Currently, we utilise the following methods of communication to keep you updated on your child's progress:

- Progress is shared with you as parents / carers in a formal capacity three times a year via parent's evening appointments in the autumn and spring and written reports in the summer. At our last parents evening sessions, we offered both face to face and telephone appointments at times which we hoped would be accessible to all this included the option to book a completely bespoke slot if you couldn't make any of those published on our website. Unfortunately, less than 60% of parents / carers attended a meeting. These meetings are invaluable in enabling us to work together to best support the children so would always encourage every parent / carer to attend.
- We use our Twitter pages to share your child's learning journey highlighting any particular successes.
- We keep you informed of our value winners and special achievements via our weekly newsletter.
- If any particular areas are identified where your child is struggling with their learning, we will invite you in to discuss this. Similarly, we encourage you to get in touch with us either by talking to a member of staff on the grounds at the start or end of the day or by sending a message to the Office dojo box. Remember that staff don't use individual mail boxes any more but messages will be sent on from the office.



Of the 90 parents / carers who answered this question, only 1 disagreed with this statement. At Allanson Street, we deliver a broad and balanced curriculum right across school – this includes all areas of learning in the Early Years and all subjects covered by the National Curriculum in Years 1 - 6. In addition to this, we introduce our children to a wealth of new opportunities through extra-curricular activities, our Steps to Success programme and a wide range of trips and activities aimed at developing the children's cultural awareness.


If you feel there is something that we should be teaching but aren't, please do get in touch with me so that we can discuss it.



97.7% of parents / carers agree with the statement that their child can take part in clubs and activities in school. 1.1% were unsure. 1.1% disagreed with this statement.

This year, we have offered a huge range of extra-curricular clubs and activities which have run before school, during lunch times and after school. These have included a wide range of sports clubs (rugby, football, basketball and dodgeball to name a few), Sculpture Club, Board Games Club, Lego Club, Crochet Club, MathsWhizz Club, Penpal Club, Science Club, Dance with Lucy, Choir, small group instrument tuition, Story-telling Club and many, many more. These activities are promoted to children in their classes and those that are interested are given letters to take home to be signed and returned to school before they can start. If your child has not attended a club but you would like them to, it may be worth speaking to their class teacher to make this known so that they can encourage your child to take a letter home and try something new.


It's worth remembering that children earn Steps To Success credits every time they attend an extra-curicular club or activity. Over 100 children earned enough credits to take part in a graduation ceremony in June. We'd love to see even more children there this year.



92.2% of parents / carers feel that school supports their child's wider personal development. 5.5% were unsure about this statement and 2.2% disagreed.

Within school, we place a high priority on developing the children's wider personal development and do this in many ways including through our wider curriculum and the provision of extra-curricular activities. We also run a cultural pathway programme which sees the children undertake a wide range of activities aimed at giving back to the community and learning new skills such as sign language and CPR.

We promote and celebrate our wider personal development offer through our Steps to Success programme. Further information about this and our cultural pathway can be found on our school website and will be given out once again during our Meet the Teacher meetings.



96.7% of parents felt that they would recommend Allanson Street Primary to another parents. I would very much appreciate it if the 3.3% of parents who felt that they wouldn't recommend us to another parent would get in touch with me so that we can discuss this and work together on whatever is causing this feeling.

At the end of our survey, we gave an opportunity for parents / carers to tell us any additional information. Staff have been absolutely overwhelmed by the wonderful comments that have been shared – thank you so much to the parents who took the time to share such positive thoughts. Please rest assured that any worries of concerns that were raised in this section have also been shared with staff so that we can continue to improve. In some cases, I have already been in touch with parents to address specific worries and will continue to do so over the next few days.

As a note for all parents / carers whether you engaged in the survey or not, please always speak with your child's class teacher or a member of the pastoral team if you have any worries or concerns. Where you feel that issues remain unresolved, please always make an appointment to speak with me or catch me at the start of the day near the Thompson Centre or on the Key Stage 2 playground for a chat. I am 100% confident that by working together we can always overcome any issue to ensure that your child has the best possible care and education at Allanson Street.

I have disagreed with certain questions not based on the school itself but because I feel that my child with additional needs is still struggling and needs more support in order to be the best she can be.

I miss having the ability to message teachers directly. I'm happy with speaking at the door but staff can seem rushed and don't always have the time to take longer messages. This has been difficult over the last couple of weeks when my child has had worries. I don't think there's much can be done about this but I found it incredibly reassuring and useful being able to contact staff directly. If there was a book or planner parents and teachers could write messages in this might help as an alternative to messages but I do appreciate this would

take a lot of time. I think the school does an amazing job with most things and it's clear the school care about the children. The only other feedback is around how events are organised as they can be very busy and impact those with anxiety.

I missed the regular photos on Dojo as I don't use Twitter.

I was a little disappointed with how my concerns about another child and their behaviour towards my child were dealt with initially as when I raised concerns, staff seemed to not know how to deal with it. Only this year has it all been dealt with to a very high standard and so I'm more at ease knowing it has now been dealt with for good.
